S-T strikers make gains, prep for future talks

Two leaders of the strike that caused Fort Worth Star-Telegram staffers to picket

their own paper say journalists face a stout national trend — the business practices of newspaper owners themselves. Slashes in staffing and a stagnant salary structure limit journalists' ability to cover their communities or even afford to live in them, **Emily Brindley** and **Kaley Johnson** told a Fort Worth SPJ Zoom gathering Feb. 22.

Fort Worth NewsGuild, and guild VP Johnson (now with the Texas Observer) said the negotiated three-year contract, including a 15% increase in starting pay to \$52,000 and broadened parental and bereavement leave, will enable the paper to better serve its readers.

"It's difficult to make a corporation understand we need higher wages and that it's a benefit to the newsroom in the long run," said Brindley, a former reporter with the Hartford Courant, the nation's oldest newspaper. "We want to have the resources to cover communities better ... (but) people need to be able to see a future for themselves to stay in a newsroom."

Star-Telegram president and editor **Steve Coffman** declined to participate in the program. The open-ended strike by approximately 20 guild members, the first of its kind for a Texas newsroom, <u>ended Dec. 22</u> after 24 days.

Chatham Asset Management owns McClatchy, one of the nation's three largest chains, which in turn owns the Star-Telegram. Hedge funds and similar entities control approximately half of American newspapers. As those chains seek to maintain profit levels, newsroom staffs nationwide have shrunk through attrition, layoffs, buyouts and sometimes closures.

Inside newsrooms, Johnson said, the cumulative loss of veteran journalists to serve as mentors, coupled with low starting salaries, has put double-barreled pressure on entry-level journalists.

"Losing all that institutional knowledge is something that's completely unacceptable," said Johnson, who published a <u>diary of the strike</u> in the Texas Observer. "An increasing number of journalists are leaving because of stress and financial instability. Unionizing helps newsrooms take back some of that power from corporations ... and we're better able to prioritize our newsrooms."

In towns where the quality, quantity and scope of reporting have significantly diminished, the term "ghost newspapers" has arisen to reflect the decline in coverage. Studies of communities where newsrooms have been shuttered, leaving their communities in "news deserts," have found a correlation with reduced voter turnout and civic obligation, increased misinformation and polarization, and higher community rates for credit.

Brindley said journalists at cross purposes with corporate ownership increasingly see organizing as a way to find a balance. She cited the ongoing strike at the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette and recent one-day work stoppages at The New York Times and The Desert Sun in Palm Springs, Calif. "We're seeing more and more strikes in journalism, which hadn't been happening in about 20 years," she said. "You're starting to see a wave of strikes or work stoppages."

Brindley said the strike had an unexpected benefit — newsroom bonding for a common cause. "The three and a half weeks we were on strike were some of the most stressful of my life," she said. "That solidarity is really why the entire thing was successful. It underscored the importance of people."

Next up locally, Johnson said, is to work with other guilds in the McClatchy chain and to prepare for negotiating the next contract. "Our role is to make sure we're already prepping to make the next contract stronger and to watch out for our current members," she said. "The future of journalism rests on newsrooms organizing to create better conditions for themselves."

"We got into journalism because we believe in it strongly," Brindley added. "But the reality is that if you want to do that impactful work, you also have to be able to pay rent."






